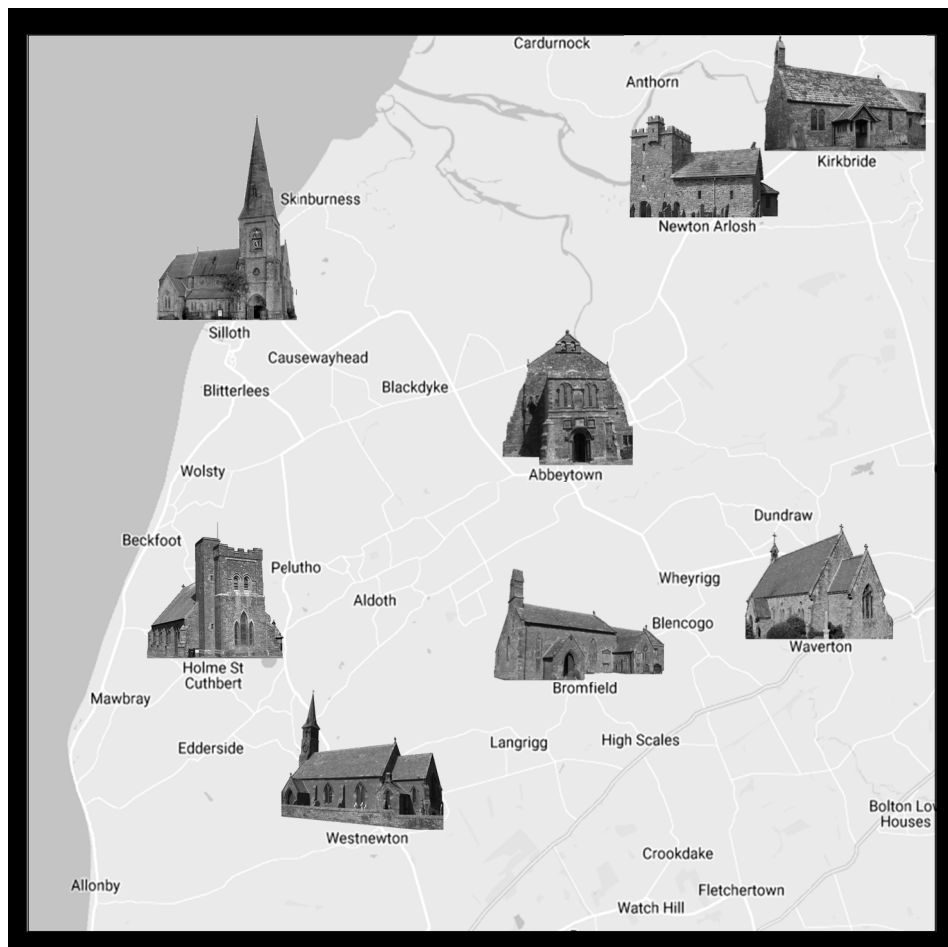

LETTER FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM

Hello everyone

I hope you've had a good holiday with some time to enjoy life and find new energy. Here we are, back at Autumn and the last third of the year. It may feel as if the seasons are running down, but I remember going to senior school for the first term, with the conkers getting ready to fall from the chestnut trees along the school drive and being really excited. Autumn is often a time of new beginning, for students or for school-leavers first taking up a job. A time of new adventure.

And Harvest is coming. Farmers are getting down to urgent, against-the-clock working after the rather more relaxed Summer.

In the church year too it can be a time of renewing our spiritual energies. There's plenty for us to do. Remember Jesus saying, The harvest is plentiful but the labourers are few, (Matthew 9:35-38)

The harvest of course – the grain to be gathered or the fish to be caught in nets or the grapes or the figs that Jesus talks about in his parables - is people. People who have missed out on Jesus. So this Autumn lets all look for new ways to approach our neighbours and teach them something about Jesus. And share his love. Let's try to spend a bit more time in prayer for guidance and learning more about Jesus and his work.

And, by the way, the Christian family is one that works best together. If you've got out of the habit (maybe after covid) of not being together with the church family, come back and join us on a Sunday or in some of the other activities listed in this magazine. Renew your own relationship with God and Jesus and join those other labourers finding ways to bring our neighbours in too.

If you're one of the neighbours, reading this magazine just for the local news and you don't bother with Jesus at all . . . give him a go. Ask one of us about him. Who is he? What does he do? Why does it matter?

Matters discussed included: Public Participation – Three members of the public were in attendance and provided Members with further some information on the church committee's proposal to turn the piece of wasteland at the churchyard into a Garden for Reflection which would include seating, trees and a wild garden section. Members were advised that the land needs clearing before the work can commence as it is overgrown and unsightly and any help either in the supply of workforce or financial would be appreciated. Planning applications received:

FUL/2023/0136 – High Croft, Blencogo - Change of use of agricultural field to vegetable plot with new access for mower and tractor to access at correct level. Planning Decisions: FUL/2023/0043 – Bromfield Hall, Bromfield - Erection of building to house robotic milking system and cubicles with solar panel array – GRANTED. FUL/2023/0100 – Bramblewood, Crookdake - Change of Use from outbuilding to holiday let (retrospective) – GRANTED. Vacancies – There are vacancies on the council following the parish elections. Causewayhead W I 14th June 2023

Today we welcomed Kelda Roe from the Cumbria Archives. Kelda is based at the Cumbria Archives Centre in Carlisle and she is an Archivist. She came to tell us about the role of Archivists and Archives. Archives are collections of information in many different forms such as letters, reports, photographs, maps. Many such items were originally kept for legal requirements e.g. Title Deeds for properties, wills and estate papers. Archivists make collections available for display and exhibitions and they are responsible for cataloguing and indexing collections. They can also help members of the public who write or email in asking for help finding information and assist people who call into the Archives searching for information too. The National Archives collection includes a range of diverse items from The Domesday Book to records of MP's tweets on social media. Archives are also collected by enthusiasts, private individuals and charities. Kelda herself worked with The Religious Archives at Windsor Castle, then for Unilever looking after brand information. She also spent a year cataloguing archives for Rugby League in Huddersfield and then found her way to Cumbria via the Mountain Heritage Trust where she catalogued things such as mittens, tents and diaries. Kelda also curated the first ever exhibition of Women's Mountain Climbers at Keswick Museum. As a county, Cumbria is lucky enough to have archives in Kendal, Barrow and Whitehaven as well as Carlisle. Carlisle has recently had a new archive built which includes 12km of mostly moveable/sliding shelving to provide maximum storage. There are 12,000 boxes of Estate Records alone. There are things as diverse as records on mining, railways, social organizations including WI collections, maps and plans, solicitors' legal documents, council documents and even court books which relate to various manors and detail worth, land, boundaries etc. The archives are accessed by many people, often they will be looking at property details, land or boundary lines or tracing family histories. Currently the archivists in Carlisle are looking to record 60,000 old wills onto a digital platform to make them more easily accessible and to limit damage from handling to the original documents in their care. Carlisle's Archives also has a conservation team who look to preserve items in the archives and they also do bookbinding work to replace badly damaged covers on old books/documents. New bindings are always sympathetic to the originals. We are hoping to arrange a visit to the Archives in Carlisle in the near future. Perhaps to peruse the history of the Women's Institute in our county

Causewayhead W I 12th July 2023

Causewayhead W I had a night time meeting and welcomed Catherine Smith who is a Cold Water Enthusiast and Forest Bather and an advocate for Trees. She came to us glowing with good health from a swim in Crummock tonight.

Catherine says the experience of being in cold water improves physical and mental well-being and that before taking up the activity she was a little lost, having raised her children to the point where they didn't need her so much, she lacked direction and was struggling with low self-esteem and not keen to meet new people. A friend managed to persuade her go into cold water to paddle and she felt invigorated. She told her husband she would be taking up cold water swimming within the year but within a week she was up to her neck in water of 4 or 5 degrees and she felt alive and energised. Within a fortnight she was hooked. If Catherine can't get out to immerse herself in a lake or river, she has a plunge barrel in her garden and in winter she will happily break the ice and get in the cold water. It gives her a sense of euphoria and a real buzz. She says a dip in the cold sets her up for the rest of the day and fills her with self-confidence and self-belief, if she can do that, she can do anything. Catherine has a friend who doesn't swim but who still finds benefits in simply standing in cold water. Simply putting your feet in a bowl of ice cubes can have a positive effect. Catherine talked of the Oyster Diving ladies in Japan who are a group of ladies in their 70s and 80's who keep themselves healthy and active by swimming. Catherine has been feeling the benefits of cold-water immersion for 3 years come March and feels as though she knows her body so well. She advocates taking no risks and being aware of your own body should you decide to have a go. Catherine then went on to talk about the positive effects of Forest Bathing and how it can help with the quest for better health. Learning to "deep breath" properly, amongst the trees and to listen to and immerse yourself in the sounds of the wood or forest can help you relax and bring about a sense of calm. In Japan "Forest bathing" has become a form of treatment for stress, anxiety and illness and the economy has moved away from pharmaceutical commitments and is now helping to replenish and maintain forests, so that people can benefit from being in them and of course air quality outside them is also greatly improved. Catherine then went on to say that Cumbria was once 97% deciduous forest with Rowans and Oaks amongst other native trees, now there is only a 7 per cent coverage and that the benefits of re foresting long term far outweigh the ones for growing for speed to feed the shorter-term manufacturing needs.

We would like to thank Catherine for giving her time to inspire us and if you see a group of ladies, from 50 to 90 plus, trousers rolled up and dipping their toes in the Solway from the shore of the West Beach, feel free to give us a wave or come and paddle with us.
